
Hugh Harris from NC DOJ will discuss the latest scams, statistics, and how to prevent them. What to do if you or a loved one falls victim to a scam.

Hugh A. Harris is an Outreach & Policy Counsel for the North Carolina Department of Justice Public Protection Section.

The Public Protection Section is focused on protecting the public and preventing crime in North Carolina. Hugh has lectured at over 150 events including CLE, CPE, and other events on topics concerning the Department of Justice's response to the opioid epidemic, NC's data breach law, identity theft, consumer protection, elder fraud, and internet safety. His work at the Department of Justice has included litigating cases on behalf of the Attorney General's Office in the area of North Carolina's Unfair and Deceptive Trade Practice law.

Hugh also has experience in worker's compensation law, working for the North Carolina Department of Justice-Workers Compensation Division. In addition, Mr. Harris has worked as a Director with the North Carolina Industrial Commission. He started his career as an Assistant Public Defender in Asheville and then relocated to the Orange-Chatham County Public Defender's Office.

Hugh is a member of the North Carolina Financial Literacy Council, North Carolina Senior Fraud Task Force, North Carolina Partnership to Address Adult Abuse, and Hope N Hoke (Opioid Task Force). In addition, he participates in the Attorney General's Criminal Justice Reform-Pretrial Roundtables.

He is a Board member of Haven House Services-Raleigh, NC and is a mentor at Moore Square Middle School. He earned his Juris Doctor from the North Carolina Central University School of Law, and his Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology from the University of North Carolina at Asheville.
